

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

angor Historical Society's Hill House is undergoing its most comprehensive restoration in over a century. The house, completed in 1836 is a Greek-revival style home designed by renowned architect Richard Upjohn for Bangor businessman Thomas A. Hill who lived in the house only briefly before losing his fortune in the panic of 1837. Subsequent residents improved the grandeur of the home, most notably Bangor Mayor Samuel Dale and his wife Matilda. Two years ago, the Board of Directors, led by President Risteen Bahr, approved a capital campaign to restore the home's elaborate granite wall, decorative iron fence, and

greek portico. "What a difference a year makes! A

year ago the granite wall restoration and the return of the ornamental fence was still a dream," says Bahr. "Now as we look out the front door of Hill House, we see a construction zone that is making that dream come true. A year ago, the thought of restoring the portico seemed too overwhelming to even believe it was possible, and today we have in our possession grants and donations totaling just over \$278,000 with another \$100,000 of funding pending via the National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund approved through the Congressionally Directed Spending program." Don't miss one of our *Soldiers at Rest* walking tours of Mount Hope Cemetery on July 21st at 10am. *Soldiers at Rest* walks the grounds of Bangor's Mount Hope Cemetery and is focused on the stories of some of the hundreds of Maine men, many from the Bangor Region, who fought in America's Civil War. Included is that of the 1st Maine Heavy Artillery that mustered in Bangor in 1862 as the 18th Maine Volunteers and was renamed in 1863. 604 men from the 1st Maine Heavy Artillery died in a single battle, the Siege of Petersburg, in June, 1864. It was the largest single day loss of any regiment throughout the course of the war. Spaces are limited and reservations are required. <u>Did You Know?</u> - Bangor Artist Jeremiah **Pearson Hardy Trained With Samuel Morse**

prominent New England painter who spent most of his career in Bangor, specializing in portraits, genre scenes, animals, and stilllifes has an interesting historical connection to the larger world of artists and entrepreneurs of the 1800s. Hardy's artistic journey was significantly influenced by his association with Samuel F. B. Morse, the renowned artistinventor. In the early stages of his career, Hardy traveled to New York to train under Morse, who was then primarily known as a painter. This mentorship proved to be

Jeremiah Pearson Hardy (1800-1888), the

pivotal in shaping Hardy's artistic skills and approach to portraiture.9 Morse, who would later gain fame as the inventor of the telegraph, imparted valuable techniques and insights to the young Hardy. After his training with Morse, Hardy

moved to Bangor, Maine, in 1826, which was then a thriving lumber port. He quickly established himself as the leading portraitist in the region, creating likenesses of many elite Maine citizens.

While new landscaping will include more appropriately sized and sited trees for the property, curator Matt Bishop notes that the beauty of the house and its architectural features are now more prominent. "The House really stands out now and you can better appreciate its Greek-revival features. We hope visitors will be drawn to the property as they see the improvements progress."
